2022 has been a difficult year for many whānau. We continue to see an increase in financial hardship, and this has been especially challenging for whānau with new-born babies and infants.

To further support whanau, ATWC has partnered with Littlemore, a charitable trust that provides whānau living in Tāmaki Makaurau with baby clothing, bedding, and other necessary equipment such as bassinets, cots, and prams. Littlemore was created in response to seeing new-born babies leaving hospitals with little or no baby essential items. This partnership has been invaluable, over the last two months Littlemore has gifted over 400 quality items

# **Anna's Story:**

"If it wasn't for Granger Grove, Idon't think Iwould have Caleb in my care."

Anna is a graduate of the Granger Grove Residential Parenting Program. We sat down with Anna to hear her story and to learn a little about her own parenting journey.

Anna spent the first six years of her life in a Russian orphanage, both she and her younger sister were then adopted and migrated to New Zealand to live. Sadly, Anna shared memories of being mistreated by her adoptive parents and this led to her being placed in statutory and consequently foster care. From the age of 11 to 21 years she moved from foster home to foster home. Anna recalls this as being a very disruptive time in her life. She was unable to build lasting relationships, make friends or connect with schoolteachers. At the age of 21 a social worker offered Ana a chance to live with his own whānau and this is where Anna experienced the support and love of a real family.

During Anna's first pregnancy, she only found out she was pregnant at five months. Because she hadn't realised she was pregnant, her first son Dominic was diagnosed with fetal alcohol syndrome. Anna developed post-partum depression and remembered saying to her mother holding her child, 'take him', because it was so overwhelming. The first six months of her son's life were the hardest for Anna as she struggled with developing a connection with her son. However, once she took herself off anti-anxiety meds, it made a huge difference, and she started to create a positive bond with her son.

Only two weeks into her second pregnancy, Anna was diagnosed with fetal alcohol syndrome; getting this diagnosis as an adult is incredibly hard to bear, and she had to learn to get through it. Late in her pregnancy Anna was supported into GG by her Social Worker. Anna told us that being at GG helped her in a multitude of ways, particularly the Mellow Parenting Programme helped strengthen her foundation skills such as identifying feelings, coping, talking to people and unpacking and healing past abuse.

Anna's journey with ATWC hasn't been without its challenges, and she is delighted that she did not ring her Social Worker to leave on her lowest day at GG. Present day Anna has a partner of five years, her eldest son is loved and looked after by her parents, and she is hugely grateful for them. Anna is a caring, compassionate mother and her son Caleb is thriving. Being in the third stage of GG, Anna is waiting to move into one of the cottages ATWC has brought for GG mums.

While no one knows what the future holds, GG has given Anna positive skills, connections, and community. If Anna had the chance, she would redo the programme all over again!

# **ATWC Anglicare Australia** National Conference 2022

This years's theme was Replenishing Hope, where various non-profit organisations were able to share stories about how they fared with the impact of COVID-19 over the last two years.

Our presentation was on Hāpaingia kia Ora (A Māori Approach To Hope-Filled Practice) and how Mana Wahine (women of strength), Aroha (all-encompassing love), Whakawhanaungatanga(getting to know each other) and Kaitiakitanga (guardianship) were implemented into practice. The conference was an excellent opportunity for our ATWC team to connect with our Australian counter parts and exchange ideas and strategies that will help ATWC navigate the unknown waters of the future and be proactive.

Toia Mai translates as "drag the canoe', this song encapsulates ATWC's stance on biculturalism as it uses metaphors of a canoe and birds to call people to come together and work cooperatively for mutual benefit. It also provided a wonderful team bonding time as staff from diverse backgrounds and cultures came together as one. Ngā mihi to our team who were the inaugural winners of the competition with their wonderful rendition of Toia Mai and received the taonga Aronui. We look forward to next year's challenge!
